Easter commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is the most important Christian festival, and the one celebrated with the greatest joy. Without Easter there would be no Christianity. Without Jesus' suffering, his execution and subsequent resurrection there would be no Christianity, for however terrible the suffering was, it was part of God's plan for the salvation of humankind.

In Western Christianity, Easter marks the end of Lent, a period of fasting and penitence in preparation for Easter, which begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts forty days (not counting Sundays).

The week before Easter, known as Holy Week, is very special in the Christian tradition. The Sunday before Easter is Palm Sunday and the last three days before Easter are Maundy Thursday or Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday (sometimes referred to as Silent Saturday). Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday respectively commemorate Jesus' entry in Jerusalem, the Last Supper and the Crucifixion.

## **BIRDBATH SEES THE LIGHT**

Birdbath always rather dreads the ‘dark’ months of January and February, when the Christmas glitter is long-since over, Lent looms bleakly, and the glorious light of Easter still seems a long way off. The theme of Light is central to the words of Jesus himself, who claims to be the embodiment of ‘the Light of the world’; and in the whole Christian message. Nature itself seems to echo this, as we move towards Easter: longer days, birds twittering at 5am, sunshine stealing round the corner of curtains suggesting it is time to get up earlier and earlier. The Bible reminds us that the light of Easter broke forth very early in the morning indeed! Birdbath has a favourite hymn (hidden away as 491 in CH4: go on, look it up!) which is also a perfect little prayer. Its author was Synesius (b.375), a pagan philosopher married to a Christian lady, who was the much-respected Roman governor of Ptolemais (in eastern Libya today). The Christian community decided they wanted him as their bishop, and he agreed provided he did not have to give up his beloved hunting-dogs (and his wife) and some of his not-very-orthodox views. He was hastily baptised and ordained, and became a dearly loved Christian leader. His hymn reflects a confused soul, like most of us (‘through darkness and perplexity’), longing to see the true Light of Easter:

*Lord Jesus, think on me,  
That when the flood is past,  
I may the eternal BRIGHTNESS see,  
And share thy joy at last!*

I'm not suggesting we'll all be fluttering and dancing in the breeze but, with God's help, we can show the same resilience as the host of golden daffodils.

Positive Press – March 2019



- Achievements of children/classes/the whole school.

Talent Show in Primary 5/6/7 – roughly 10-12 children took part in a talent show in class. Talents on show were dance, judo, comedy and music (guitar and chanter). It was very entertaining show and P1/2 came along as an audience. The winners were 1<sup>st</sup> place Beth & James, Runners up were Ben S. and Angus, Harry and Martin and Ben L.

In P3/4 we have some people who have achieved their goals. Rowan has done really well with her maths and in growing in confidence – she now believes in herself and has found out how to figure it out. Holly thinks good teaching has made a difference.

- Examples of the great learning that has been going on.

P5-7 – history and geography of Scotland, through the eyes of a travel agent – has helped the children learn more about the places and the past here in Scotland. Maths has also been developing really well – we are doing more white-board work and using playing cards to help work out and solve problems. This is helping with strategies. Number Talks and Numicon has really helped lots of children in the class.

P1-2 – have been learning about castles and have been building their own very, very cool castle in the classroom. They have been bringing their learning to life.

P3-4 – have just started learning about life under the sea, and have been working on individual projects about things like dolphins, stingrays, and things like that. They have been researching from books and the internet, putting things into their own words and copying things from the computer. The best bit of the topic, I would have to say, are the Science experiments with ice which we did in the cold weather, looking at what would happen when salt was added to the ice, or hot water was compared to cold water for freezing. We saw the water vapour and it was cool.

- School news or changes.

In a couple of weeks we are getting our new outdoor classroom which we can use as a shelter, a buddy area and a classroom. It will be exciting to see it arrive and get put up.

In maths and numeracy we are seeing the benefits of using the Number Talks approach. Children are more confident, more determined and better equipped to find strategies to help them work through really tough number challenges.

As always, Yetholm is a great place to be, set in the beautiful Cheviot hills. We are enjoying the snowdrops and daffodils starting to poke their heads above the ground, and the Junior Janitors keep feeding the birds. Roll on Spring!

### **What does World Mission mean now a days?**

The World Mission Council of the Church of Scotland once sent out missionaries to colonized countries, taking with them Western forms of faith and worship. As a result Christianity is often still linked to ‘the West’ and this can cause problems.

Today World Mission in the Church of Scotland means something very different. A recent publication, ‘Living Together in a World of Religions’, acknowledges: ‘we in Scotland have at least as much to learn and receive from the world church as we might have to teach or give.’ The World Mission Council of the Church of Scotland condemns all forms of religious discrimination and encourages Christian communities in Scotland and abroad to build bridges and become friends with neighbours from other faith traditions.

World Mission sends out regular newsletters on their work and these are available in Morebattle and Yetholm Churches. The following is one example, from Israel and Palestine, of the kind of work they support:

‘Rabbis for Human Rights (RHR), an Israeli organization working in both Israel and Palestine, gives expression to the traditional Jewish responsibility for the safety and welfare of the stranger, the weak, the widow and the orphan. Combining practical grassroots support with political pressure and advocacy, RHR believes it has a duty, in light of the Jewish tradition, to address injustices.

From the outset, RHR has campaigned for the rights of Palestinians and has provided legal support to Palestinian communities threatened by land theft and harassment. They have championed the causes of Israeli minorities, sought to educate emerging leaders on human rights and mobilized thousands of volunteers to put the vision of a just society in practice.’

From time to time we shall report more stories, drawn from World Mission’s newsletters, of bridge building and fellowship between Christianity and other communities and faiths across the world.

### **Yetholm Heritage Centre Project**

Yetholm History Society was recently awarded £100 from the Apple Windfall Fund. We are very grateful for this money and thought we would explain how we will use it.

Our aim is to transform our Mission Hall into a comfortable and safe place for our meetings and annual exhibition and to provide secure

storage for our archives. We also hope to furnish our Hall as a Heritage Centre, with interpretative panels, that would be open to the public during the summer months, attracting tourists to the village. To make our mission Hall safer and more easily accessible, we plan to install a disabled door and ramp.

Our project is in three parts.

1. To equip the interior of the Hall to make it a safe and comfortable place for meetings and to provide secure housing for our archives.

- By providing secure cupboards for our archives
- By installing projecting equipment and a screen – to be permanently fixed to the wall and roof of the Hall
- By improving our lighting
- By purchasing comfortable chairs
- By laying better and safer carpeting

2. To provide a Heritage Centre that will attract tourists to the village by commissioning 11 illustrated interpretative panels telling the history of Yetholm and the surrounding area from earliest times to the 1900s. Eight of the panels would be fixed permanently to the walls of the Mission Hall and three, telling the story of the church in Yetholm from the 1100s on, would be sited in the Upper Room of the Kirk. There would also be a display of some of the twelfth century stones surviving from the first stone kirk. The Mission Hall and the Kirk would be open to visitors to view these panels during daylight hours during the summer months. (See artist's impressions 1 and 2 below).

The interpretative panels would include among other topics:

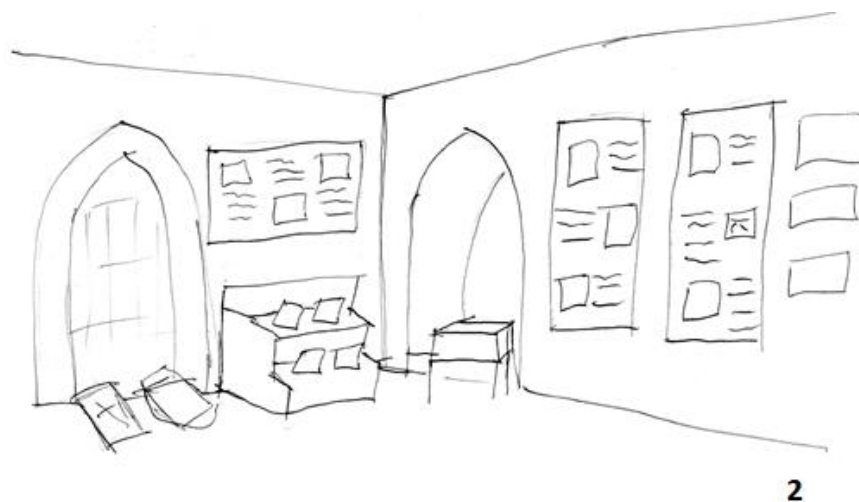
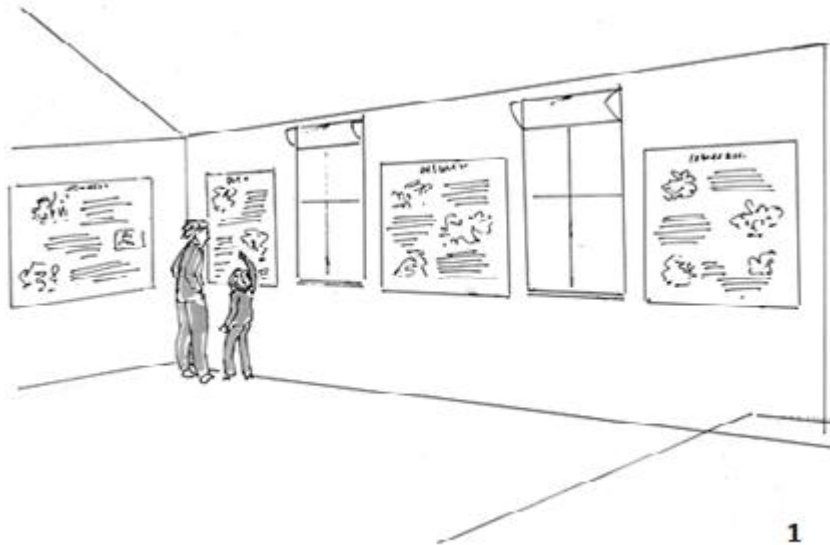
- Yetholm's bronze age shields and the iron age forts on the hills
- Border warfare and reiving
- Kirk Yetholm's gypsy heritage
- Yetholm's festival and Shepherds' Show

3. To improve access to and egress from the Hall for people in wheelchairs or with walking difficulties by inserting a disabled access to replace the middle window on the West side of the Hall. This would lead to a ramp. The entrance path will be changed to lead more directly to the road. Low level lighting will be installed to light the path. The disabled access could be used as an emergency exit if necessary. (See artist's impression 3).

We have already made a start of our improvements to the Mission Hall by installing much improved and safer heating. We were able to do this with

a previous grant of £100 from the Apple Windfall Fund plus approx. £2000 from SBC Community Grant Scheme.

For the next stages, we have applied to various sources of funds, as well as the Apple Windfall Fund. The Apple Windfall Fund has again been generous and we are waiting to hear from other funders. In addition, we have raised £2000 through sales of our Village guide (*Yetholm Past & Present*), so please continue to recommend it to all your friends and neighbours.





### **The Morebattle and Yetholm Windfall Fund**

After a bumper harvest last Autumn the task of selling the resultant apple juice and cider is going well. The Morebattle and Yetholm Windfall Fund recently reached a major milestone as it passed the £2,500 mark of funds raised since it started in August 2017. The Committee met in January and allocated £1,415 of funds to 14 organisations across the two villages. Details of the successful bids are available on the Windfall Fund Facebook Page (@MYwindfallfund) or can be obtained by emailing [simplyroddy@hotmail.co.uk](mailto:simplyroddy@hotmail.co.uk) Together with the £850 distributed last year we have thus raised and paid out a total of £2,265 since launch.

The Windfall Fund would like to thank all those who donated their apples, helped pick, pack or transport apples to Thistlycross in Dunbar or simply bought and enjoyed apple juice and cider to support the fund raising efforts. A huge thank you also to owners and staff at our two shops and three hotels for their support with sales.

### **Morebattle Community Shop Update March 2019**

At the last update (November 2018) we were in the process of collecting all share monies pledged in order to purchase the shop. I can now report that there are 207 Shareholders who have invested a tremendous £63,075 in the project to keep the shop open. This is an amazing achievement!

On Monday 14 January 2019 we officially purchased the shop and took over its running. The day didn't start too well as the Post Office's own line went down and we were unable to do any transactions! Since then, Louisa our interim consultant, the staff and volunteers have worked hard to transform the place. The shop and the stock look tidy and well organised. There has been a lot of positive feedback.

We've tried to make this transition period as smooth as possible by keeping on the regular suppliers. In the future we will be looking to increase stock levels and introduce new lines. The fresh food produce has proved a real hit along with a newly purchased hot drinks machine. We have installed new lighting in the back part of the shop and we now have a new "Morebattle Community Shop" sign.

The Post Office Outreach Service operates on a Monday and Thursday. It is vital that we fully support this service to ensure it continues.

We held a lovely farewell party for Anne Brown, the previous shop owner, which was very well attended and certainly showed Anne how much we have appreciated her service to the village over the last nine plus years. She was presented with flowers and an engraved silver salver. Morebattle Community Shop will be holding their first AGM on 1st May 2019 in Morebattle Village Hall at 7pm. All shareholders are very welcome to attend. One of the things we will be doing is to elect a new Board of Management who will decide on the future running of the shop. It's still not too late to become a Shareholder and get involved. ## **KIRK SESSION REPORT**

Since the last Cheviot the Kirk Session has met in January, February and March and the following business covered.

Many of the discussions centred on the purchase of a new Manse, and at this point in time the Trustees of the Church of Scotland have made and have had an offer accepted on the Old Police House in Morebattle, subject to the approval of the Presbytery and the results of a survey.

Six new members, Mr and Mrs Rustad, Mr and Mrs Fraser and Mr and Mrs Stoddart have been admitted to full membership of Cheviot Churches.

A small group made up of Susan Stewart, Gordon McInally and Graeme Watson have been appointed to look at ways of making more use of the church building and any suggestions from the congregation would be very welcome.

The Session agreed that the possibility of setting up travel rotas for the churches should be looked into and Trish Gentry has agreed to do this for the Yetholm area and Anne Brown for Morebattle.

Mark Calder was carrying out a sponsored run along the St Cuthbert's way, passing through our parish. Mark was raising funds for the charity "Embrace the Middle East" and it was agreed to hold retiral offerings in both churches on 10<sup>th</sup> March. Subsequently Mark's supporting team was given a cheque for £100.

It was agreed that Cheviot Churches should re-join the group Kelso Churches Together and that Stuart Kelly, Leslie Thomson and Anne Brown would attend such meetings on the behalf of our churches.

The church has been instructed by Presbytery to obtain certificates to show that the buildings are free of asbestos. It was agreed that this should be done.

The churches are also due a quinquennial inspection of the fabric of all our buildings and this should be carried out in June of this year.

The commemorative plaque for the names of the ministers who have served in Morebattle Church has now been agreed by the Church of Scotland, so can now be put in place.

During Holy Week the following services will take place. April 18<sup>th</sup>, Maundy Thursday, a joint service in Linton Church in Linton Church conducted by Mrs Liz Finlay and this will be in the form of an Agape service; on April 19<sup>th</sup>, Good Friday, a vigil in Hoselaw Chapel from 2.00 p.m. to 5.00 p.m. will be conducted by Rev. Dr Ian Clark and on April 21<sup>st</sup>, Easter Sunday, a joint communion service will be held in Yetholm Church conducted by Rev. Dr Ian Clark.

### **Forward Planning For Our Churches**

Yetholm Kirk hosted a productive and enlightening evening with our neighbours from Kelso North and Ednam, Kelso Old and Sprouston and the Kelso Country Churches to discuss how best we can co-operate in the future. The results from a very open discussion will be collated and taken to Presbytery. In the face of declining rolls and the very real possibility of "mothballing" or even closing some churches, groups from all four areas talked about the strengths, the challenges and the differences between us.

A number of common themes emerged. The need for new, and younger, members was addressed with suggestions about a dedicated Youth Ministry and a more proactive role for Elders and congregation members. We were encouraged to look at the successes of other churches in order to see what they were doing well, and whether it could be replicated in our own parishes. Although action is clearly required, we were reminded that

prayerfulness is a key aspect, and brings its own results. The importance of trained and willing Worship Groups was raised, as well as the importance of the pastoral aspect of the ministry, and the hope was expressed that people could have a sense of continuity in their dealings with the churches.

We should not be despondent; and the churches have shown a remarkable resilience. As was once said, the Church is an anvil that has worn out many hammers. With God behind us, we should not fear whatever lies ahead of us.

### **The Boys Brigade – Faith in Young People Boy's Brigade Scotland**

The Boys' Brigade is a volunteer-led youth organisation, which provides youth work to the Christian church.

We are committed to ensuring lives are enriched by helping children and young people reach their full potential by providing opportunities to meet together and engage in a range of fun and developmental activities and experiences.

Today, the Boys' Brigade and the church face the same challenge of being more visible in our outreach and engagement with the wider community. The BB has a unique role to play as a mission partner for the church in Scotland. For many churches the BB provides a bridge into communities that they otherwise might find difficult to access, providing opportunities to engage young people and also their families.

Our new partnership with the Guild focuses on growing The Boys' Brigade across Scotland. We think this is particularly fitting to launch this during 2018, Scotland's Year of Young People. Specifically this partnership will focus on three areas:

- Growth in Faith
- Growth in community partnerships
- Growth in Young People

### **Malawi Fruits – Growing the Future**

Malawi Fruits is a Scottish Christian Charity committed to working in Malawi to support young farmers in the North of the country.

Our aim is to lift hundreds of small-scale farmers out of poverty, and we see opportunities to bring great help through irrigation and crop processing.

We have a strong affinity with the Guild because of our shared commitment to practical Christian care. Our project Growing the Future is a new approach to supporting young farmers and bringing Good News.

We look forward to working in partnership with the Guild and together we will:

- Work with Church Youth Groups to train and support the young people to grow cash crops using modern methods.
- Provide solar-powered Futurepumps to enable the young people to grow crops using irrigation.
- Provide access to a tractor and plough as part of the “Green Revolution” for these young farmers.
- Connect young people with processing facilities and good markets to ensure that they are not exploited in any way.

Throughout all this, we will work with the Youth Groups to help young people recognise this help as a blessing from God and as a connection with the Global Church through the Guild and Malawi Fruits.

### **Seema’s Project – Free to Live Trust**

Seema's project began initially in 2014 with the aim of building a home for abandoned street children from the red-light district of the city of Pune, India, and to build a rehabilitation centre for rescued victims of the sex industry.

### **Sailor’s Society – A Chaplin for our Ports**

Sailors’ Society is an international Christian charity working in ports across the world.

### **Journeying Together – World Mission Council**

Journeying Together helps teenage mums in Kanyama to build a life of promise for themselves and their children.

## Help us say pants to poverty

**Smalls for All** is a registered charity and was founded in 2010 by Maria Macnamara who lives in Livingston, Scotland. Maria set up Smalls for All after taking part in several volunteer trips where she worked in orphanages. It was after she returned from a trip to Ethiopia that she knew she wanted to do even more to help if she could.

She had learnt about some of the problems that not having underwear could cause and recognised that there was often a shortage of underwear in poorer parts of Africa. Many of the women



and children had just one pair of pants, or no pants at all. And that's why Maria decided to set up Smalls for All, a simple response to a real need.



Smalls for All collects and distributes underwear to women and children in Africa. We help those living in orphanages, slums, IDP camps and schools, as well as providing underwear to hospitals to help those suffering from medical conditions like obstetric fistula.

Underwear is a luxury that some people can't afford. Giving pants and bras may seem like a small thing, but it can make a huge difference. For example, not having underwear can mean young girls miss days off school each month.



We often work with the schools and orphanages we support with our underwear to pay for the education of children too, to give them the opportunity of a better future.
